A. Boise Valley Economic Partnership (BVEP) Presentation(s) [*Presentation provided herein as Exhibit A*]

Beth Ineck, Boise Valley Economic Partnership introduced herself and discussed her background.

Beth Ineck, Boise Valley Economic Partnership discussed the Boise Valley Economic Partnership and its relationship to the Boise Metro Chamber of Commerce.

Beth Ineck, Boise Valley Economic Partnership explained the type of jobs and businesses BVEP attempts to recruit into the Boise Metro area and how they have changed over the course of the last few years.

Beth Ineck, Boise Valley Economic Partnership explained commute patterns in relation to job opportunities for the Boise Metro Area, touching on various cities in the Metro Area.

Committee Member John Laraway asked clarifying questions in relation to Retirees and residents who work from home.

Beth Ineck, Boise Valley Economic Partnership responded, explaining that the data presented is from the Census.

Committee Member Cristin Sandu asked a question about the date of the data.

Beth Ineck, Boise Valley Economic Partnership explained that the data is from 2021 and further explained that there is typically 2 years behind the current year.

Beth Ineck, Boise Valley Economic Partnership brought up population over the past 30 years projected population growth patterns through 2050 as well as in-migration and out-migration patterns by County in the area. The age of the population was also brought up by County, highlighting the differences between Canyon and Ada Counties.

Beth Ineck, Boise Valley Economic Partnership explained data regarding Occupation and Job growth in Ada County and the City of Kuna as well as how businesses choose to locate or relocate to a particular site.

Beth Ineck, Boise Valley Economic Partnership explained the City's role in business development, acquisition, retention, and expansion as well as the checks and balances of Public-Private Partnerships.

Beth Ineck, Boise Valley Economic Partnership ended her presentation by asking if there were any questions.

A. Land Use and Property Taxes – Morgan Treasure, Economic Development Director

Economic Development Director Morgan Treasure explained that there is a significant burden on homeowners within the City of Kuna.

Economic Development Director Morgan Treasure explained the different tax districts that receive funds from property taxes that City of Kuna Residents pay and gave examples.

Economic Development Director Morgan Treasure showed charts related to tax burden in Kuna by property type.

Committee Member Cristin Sandu asked a clarifying question in regard to the amount of Agricultural land that is 'in-use' versus 'being held.'

Planning and Zoning Director Doug Hanson responded.

Committee Member Beverly Wolf asked about Tax exemptions and how long it takes for commercial property to have a net effect on tax burden within the City.

Economic Development Director Morgan Treasure responded explaining that tax exemptions that Committee Member Beverly Wolf is referring to have to be approved with the Ada County Commissioners and no projects to date have been approved for a tax exemption in that manner.

Economic Development Director Morgan Treasure gave an example of a business that exists within the County but is located close to the City that had a tax exemption approved in that manner.

Committee Member Cristin Sandu asked about the rezoning process for lands designated as agricultural.

Planning and Zoning Director Doug Hanson responded.

Committee Member Laraway brought up how it appears the Mixed-Use zone has been used by developers.

Economic Development Director Morgan Treasure explained that High Density Housing typically pays more per square foot in property tax than single family residential.

Committee Members discussed the pace of housing applications within the City.

Committee Members discussed current and future road use.

Economic Development Director Morgan Treasure discussed how a new Industrial park in City Limits will impact levy rates.

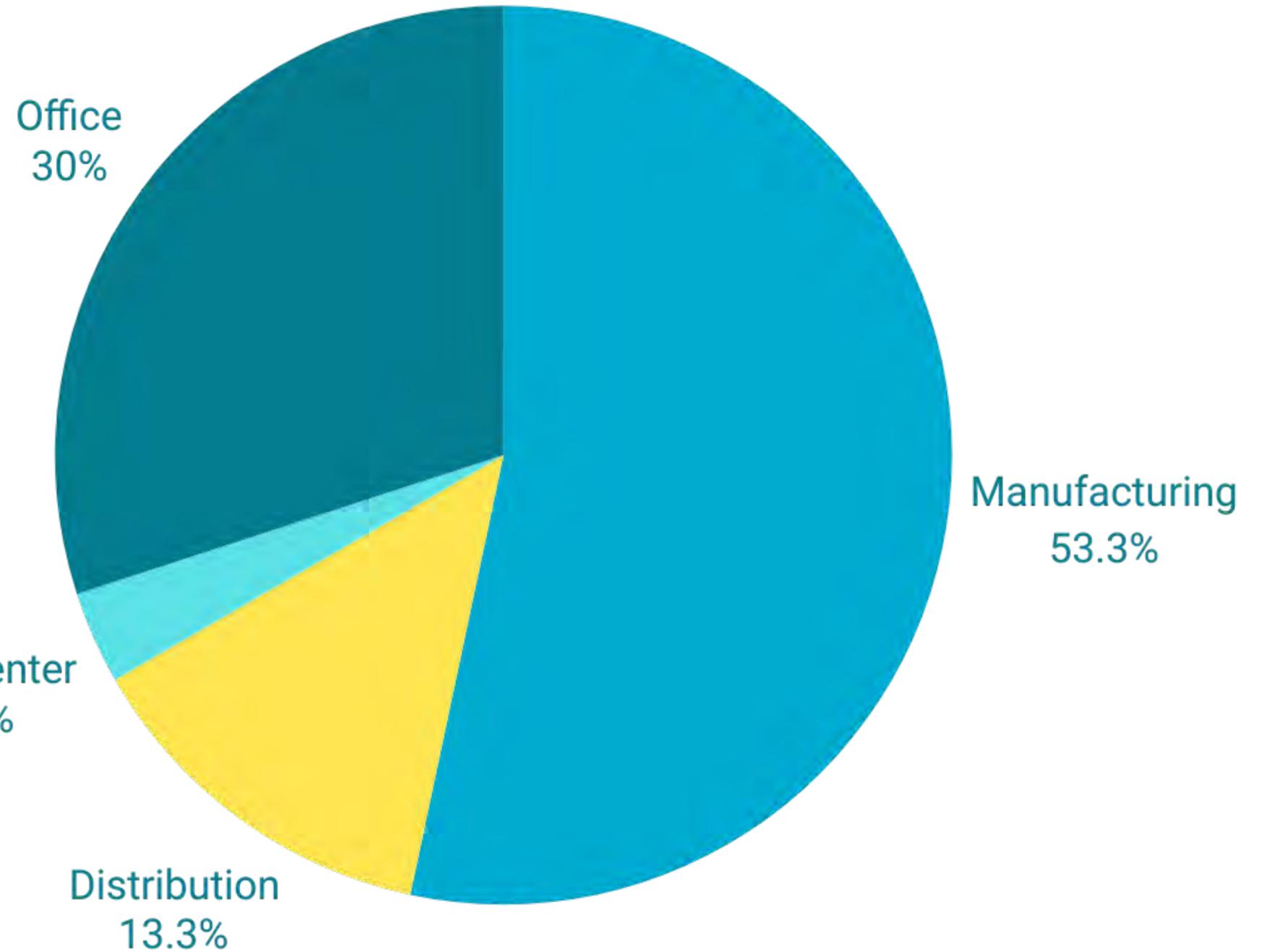

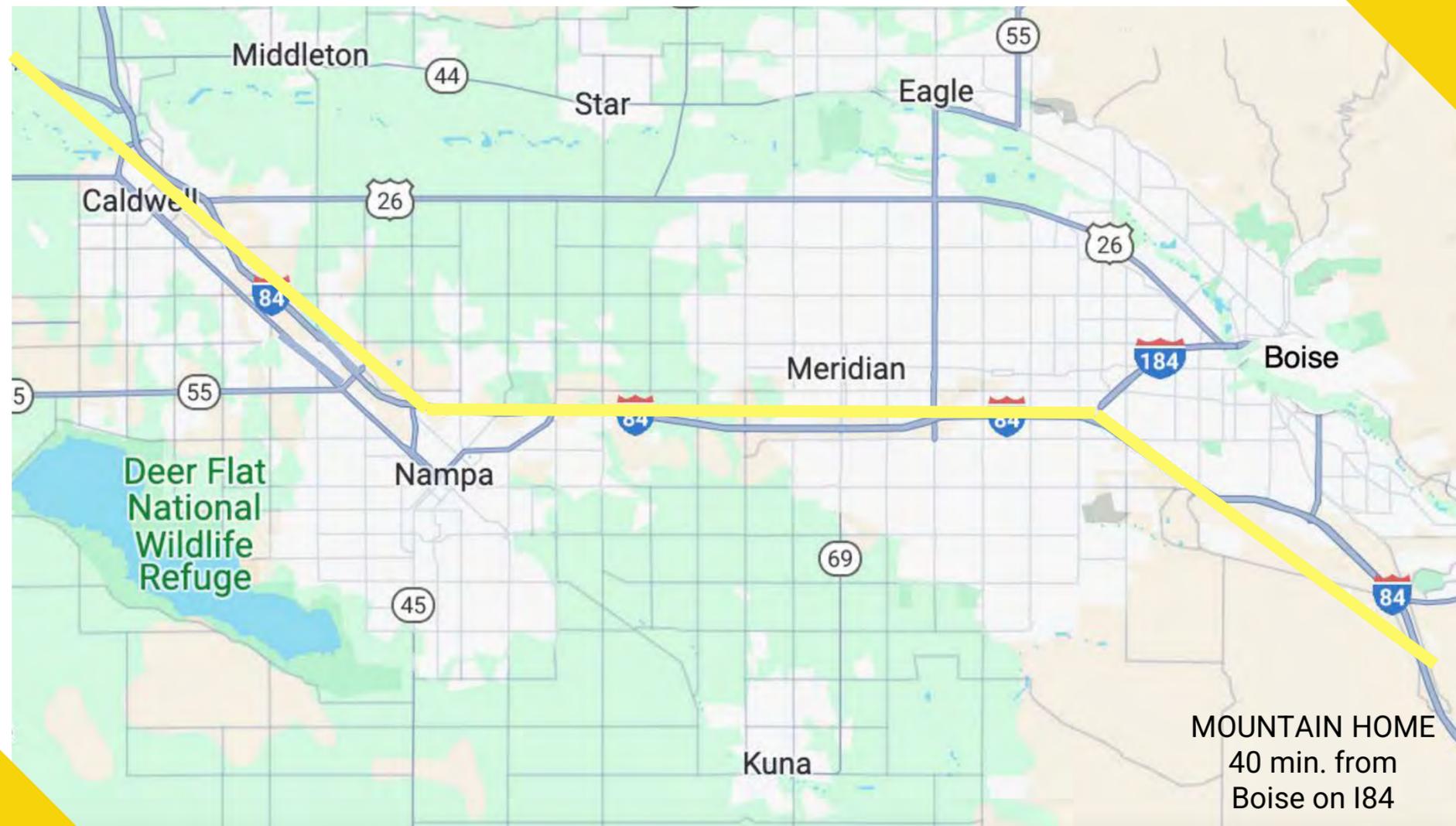

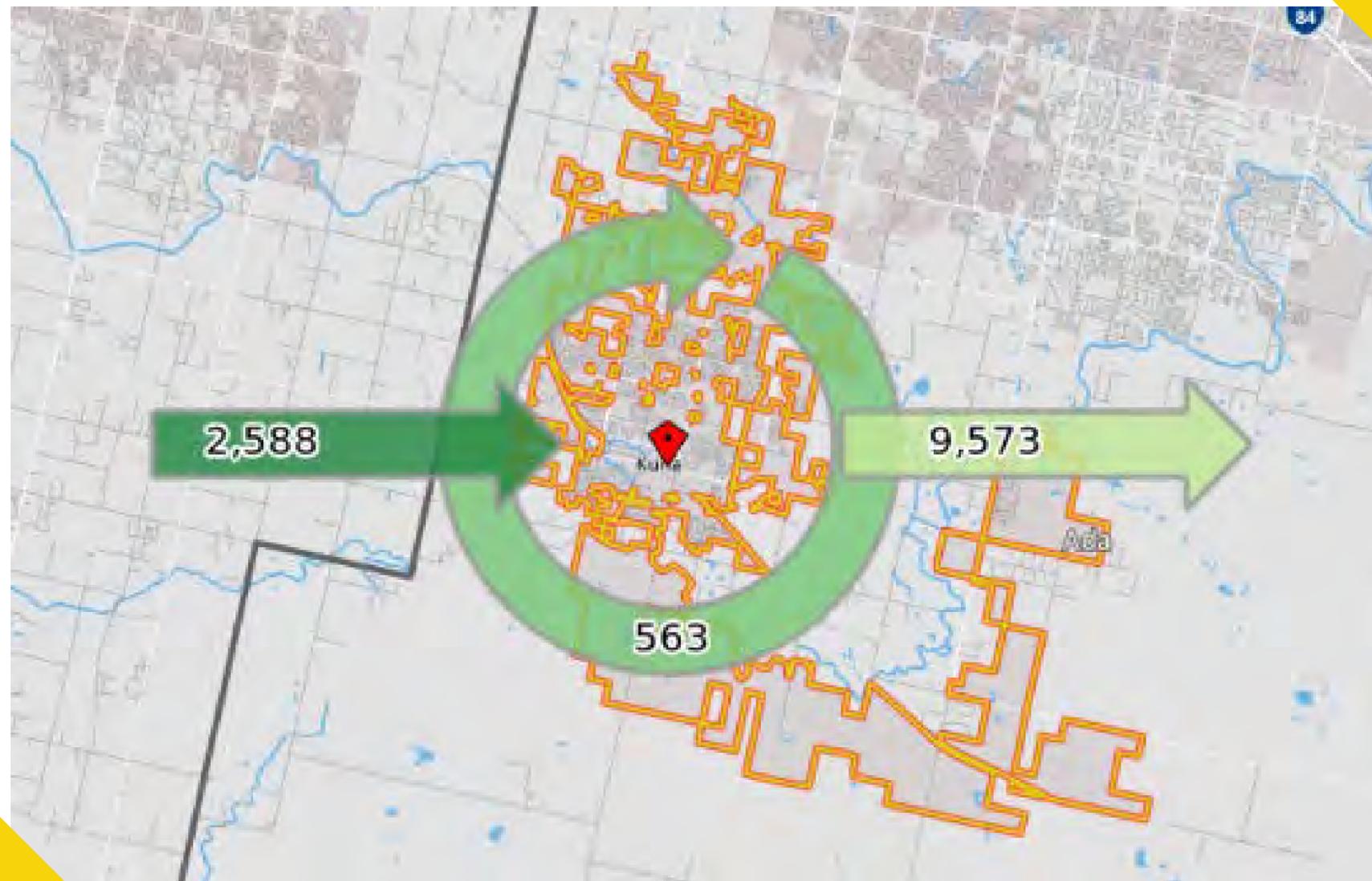

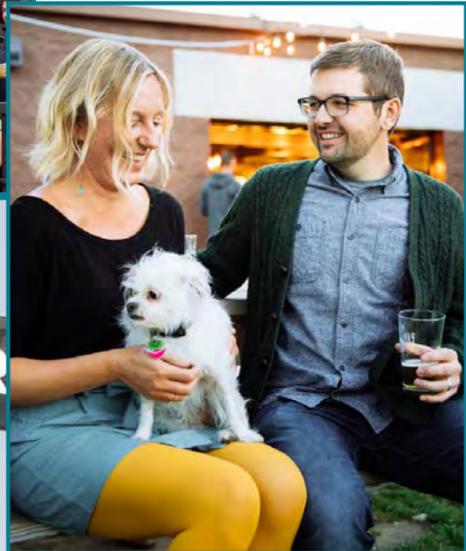
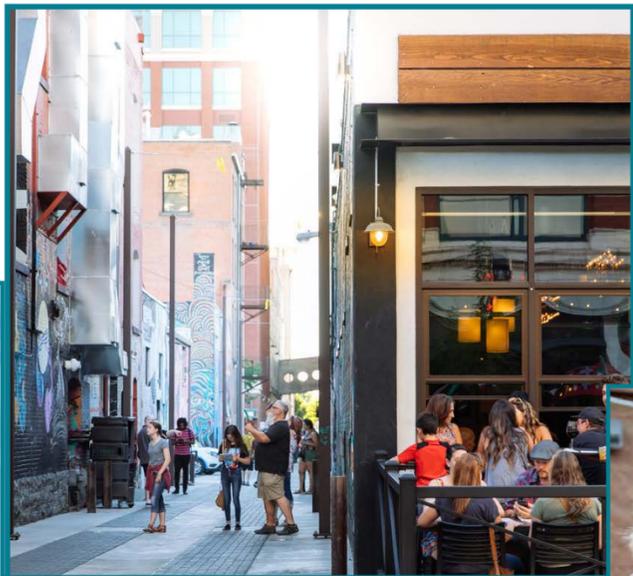

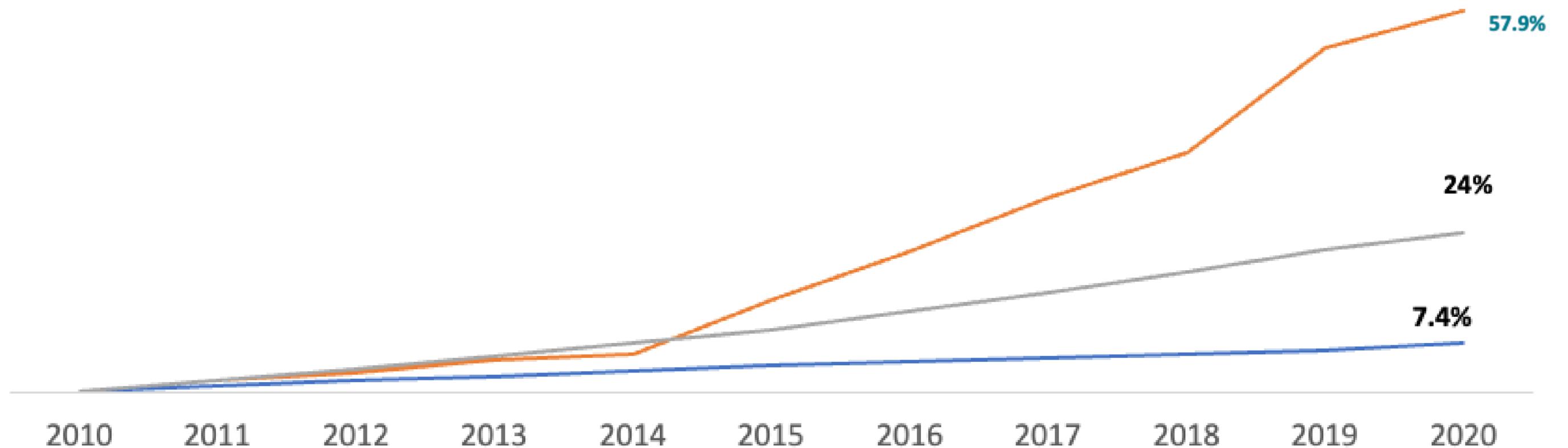

Population Growth 2010 - 2020

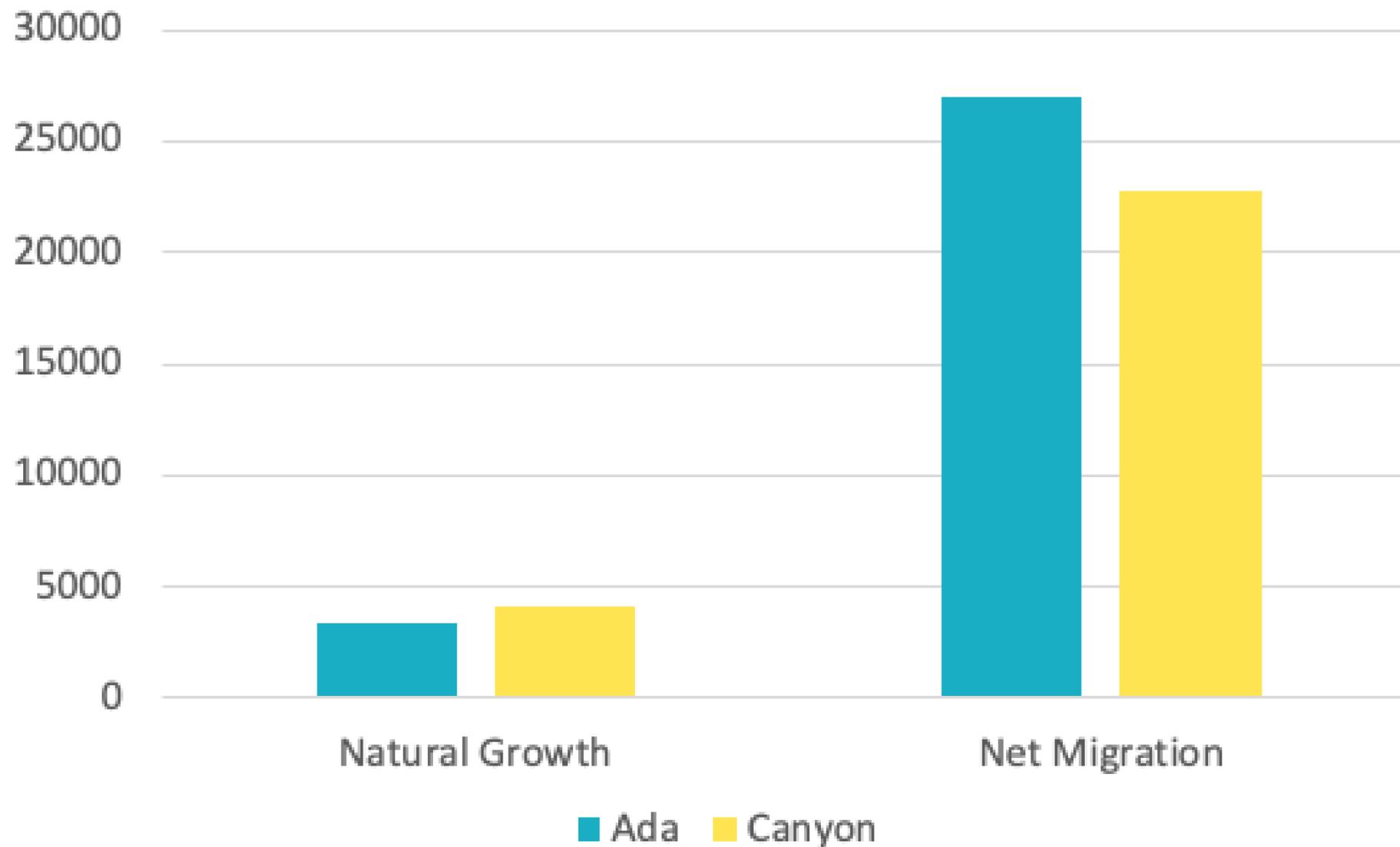

NATURAL GROWTH VS IN MIGRATION

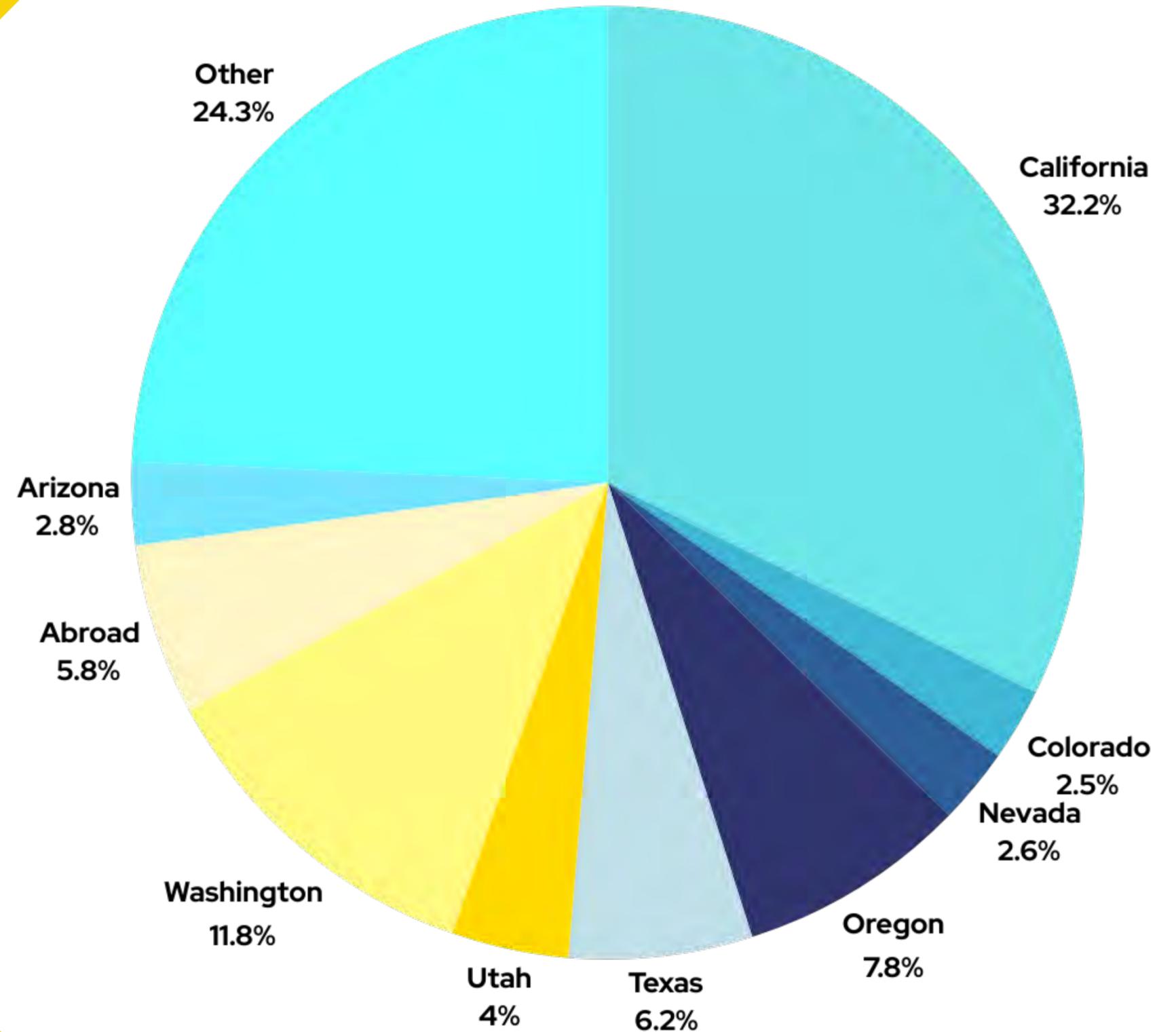
Cumulative Population Change 2020-2023

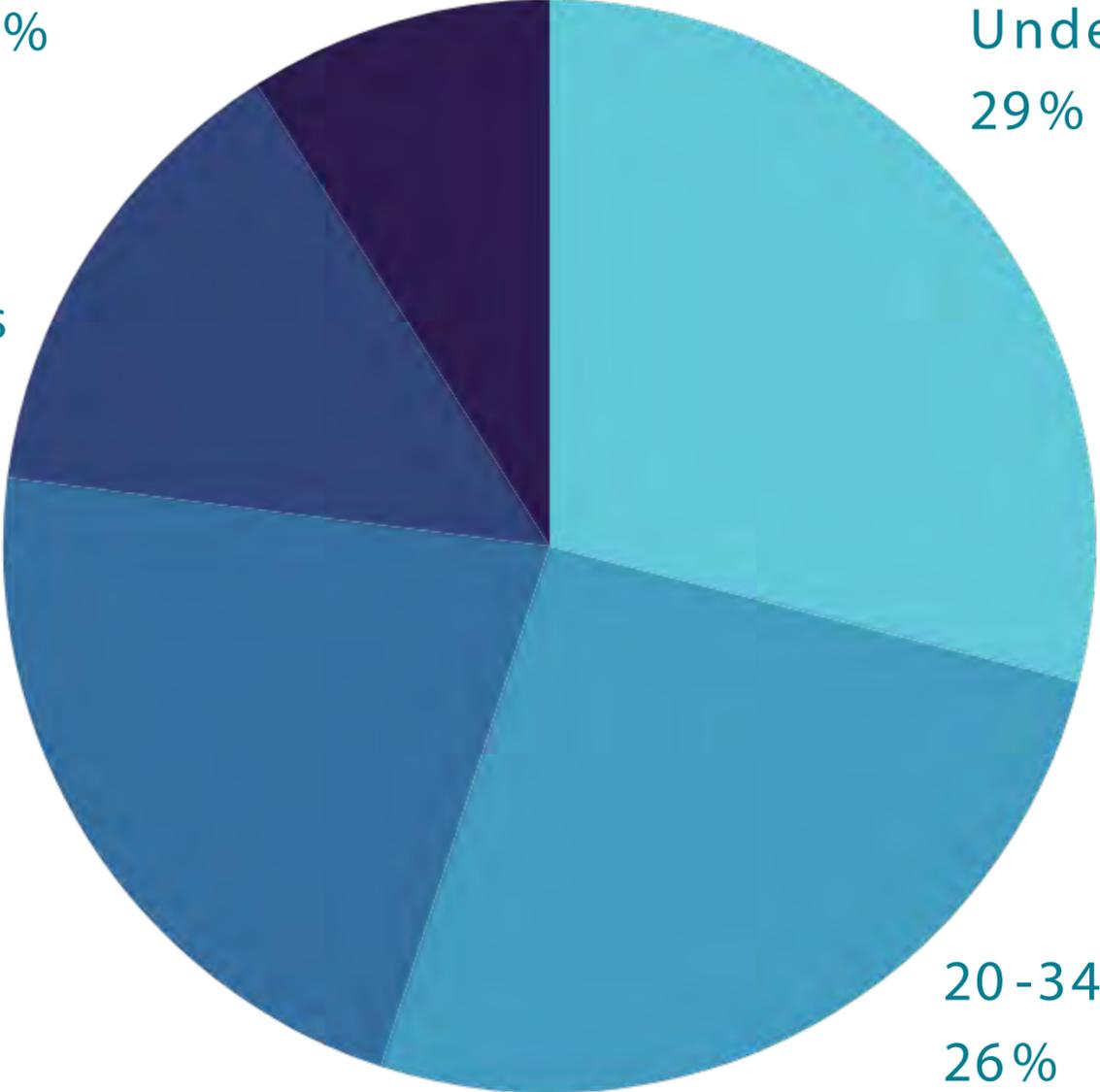

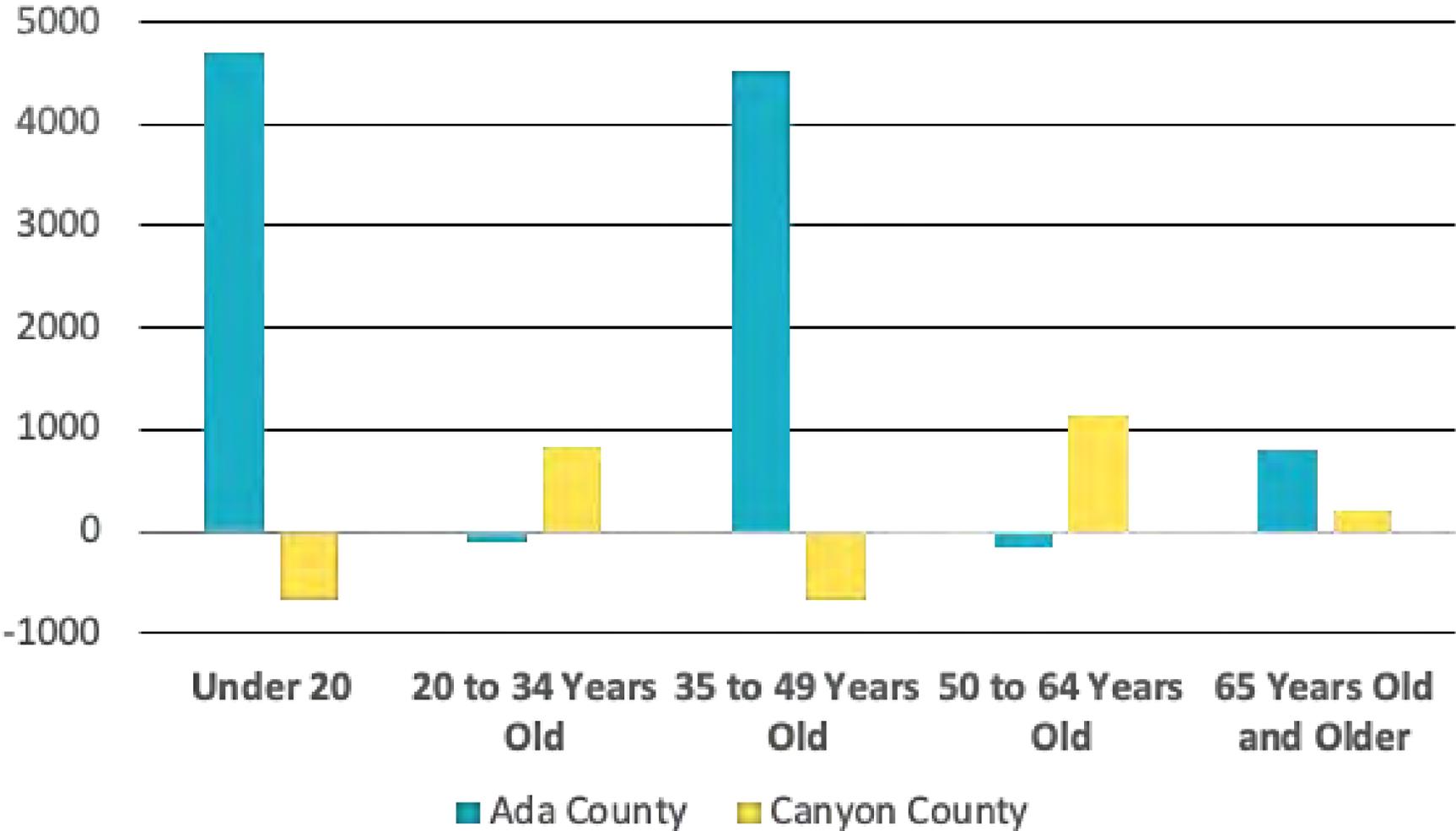

County



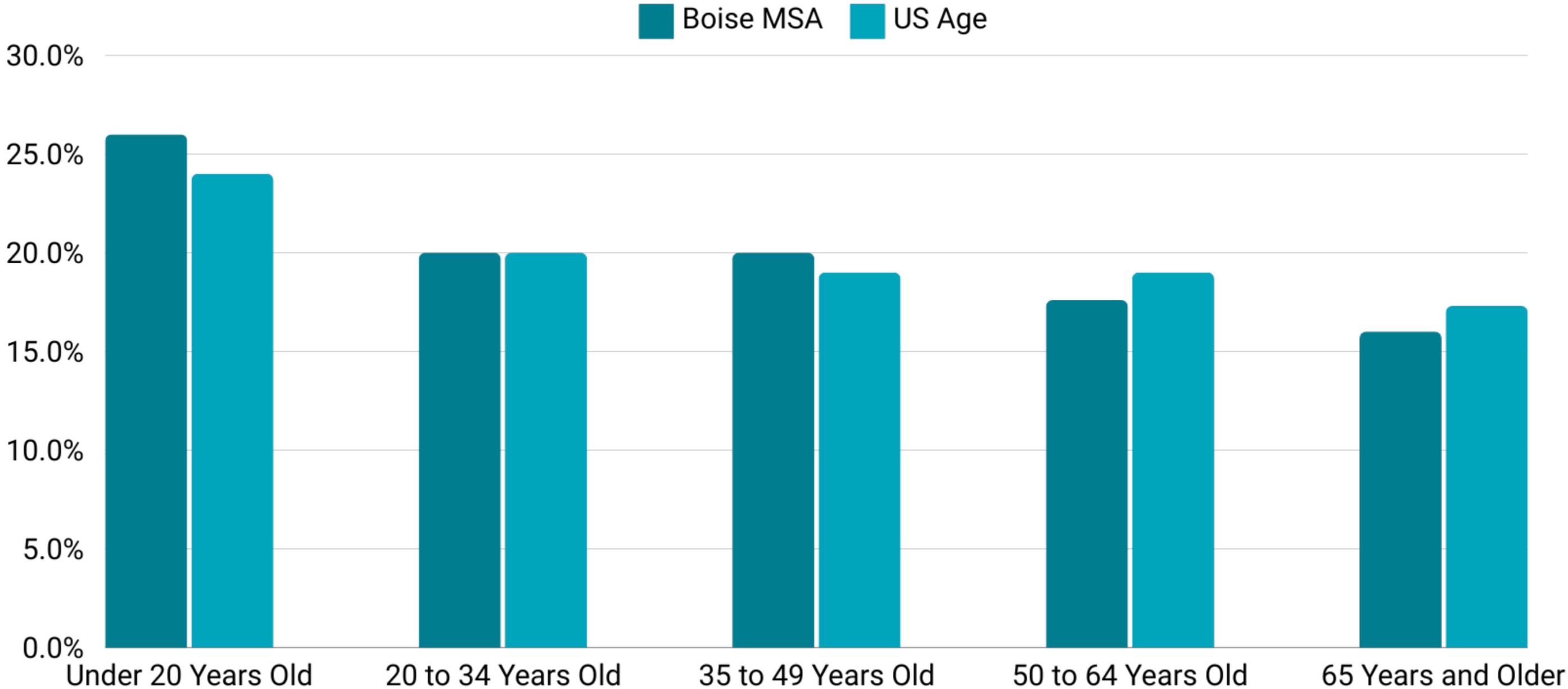
NET MIGRATION OUT OF STATE AND ABROAD MOVERS

BOISE METRO POPULATION BY AGE

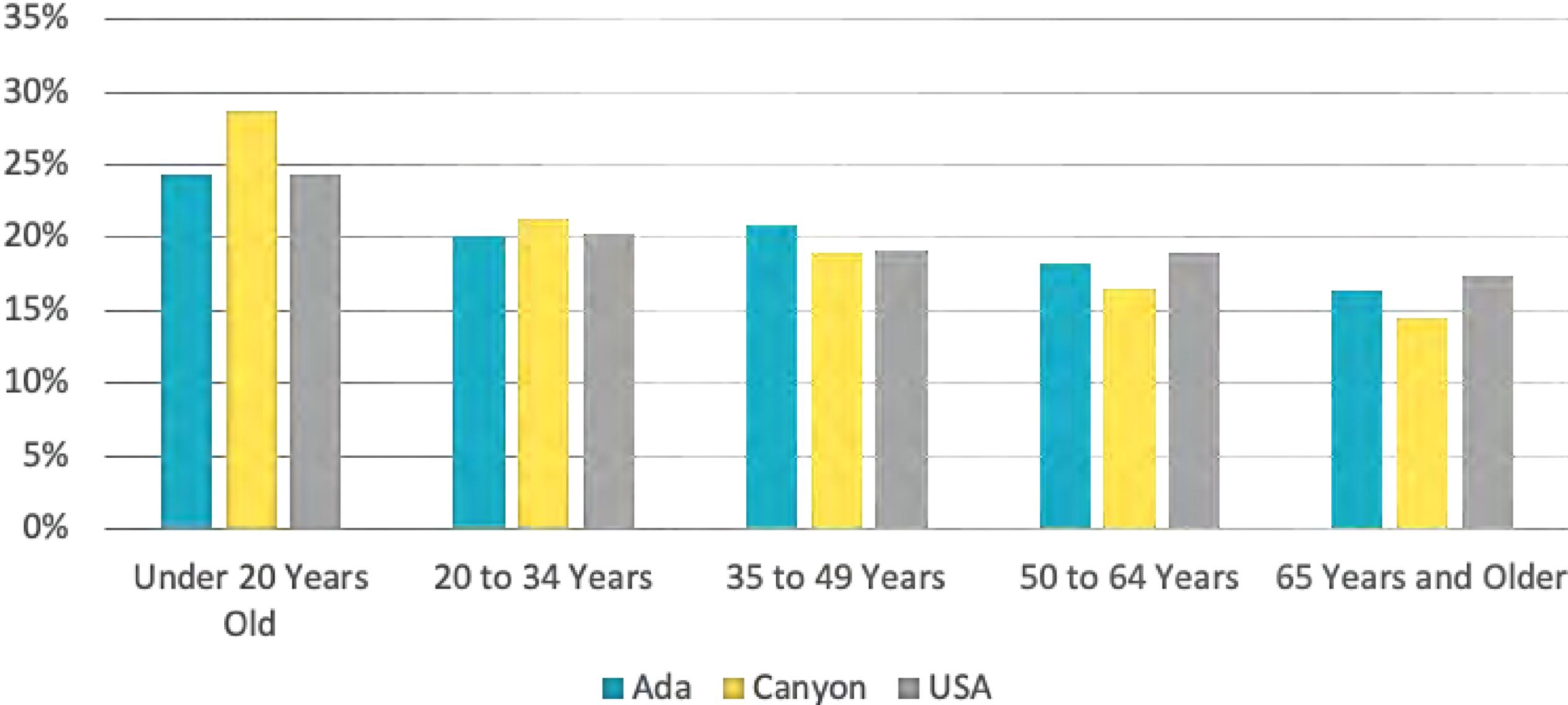
Boise MSA Population (2023): 824,657

POPULATION BY AGE & COUNTY

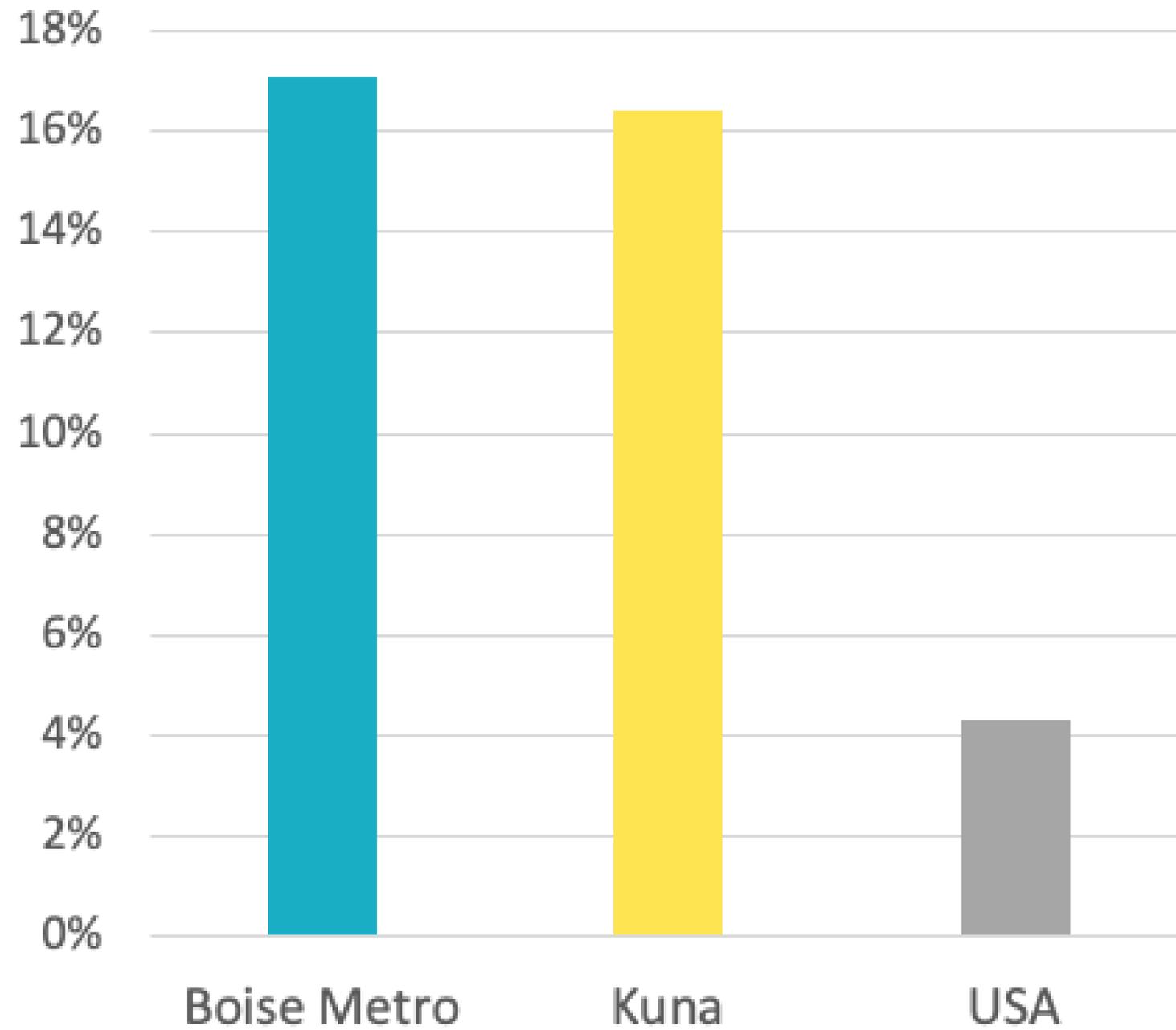

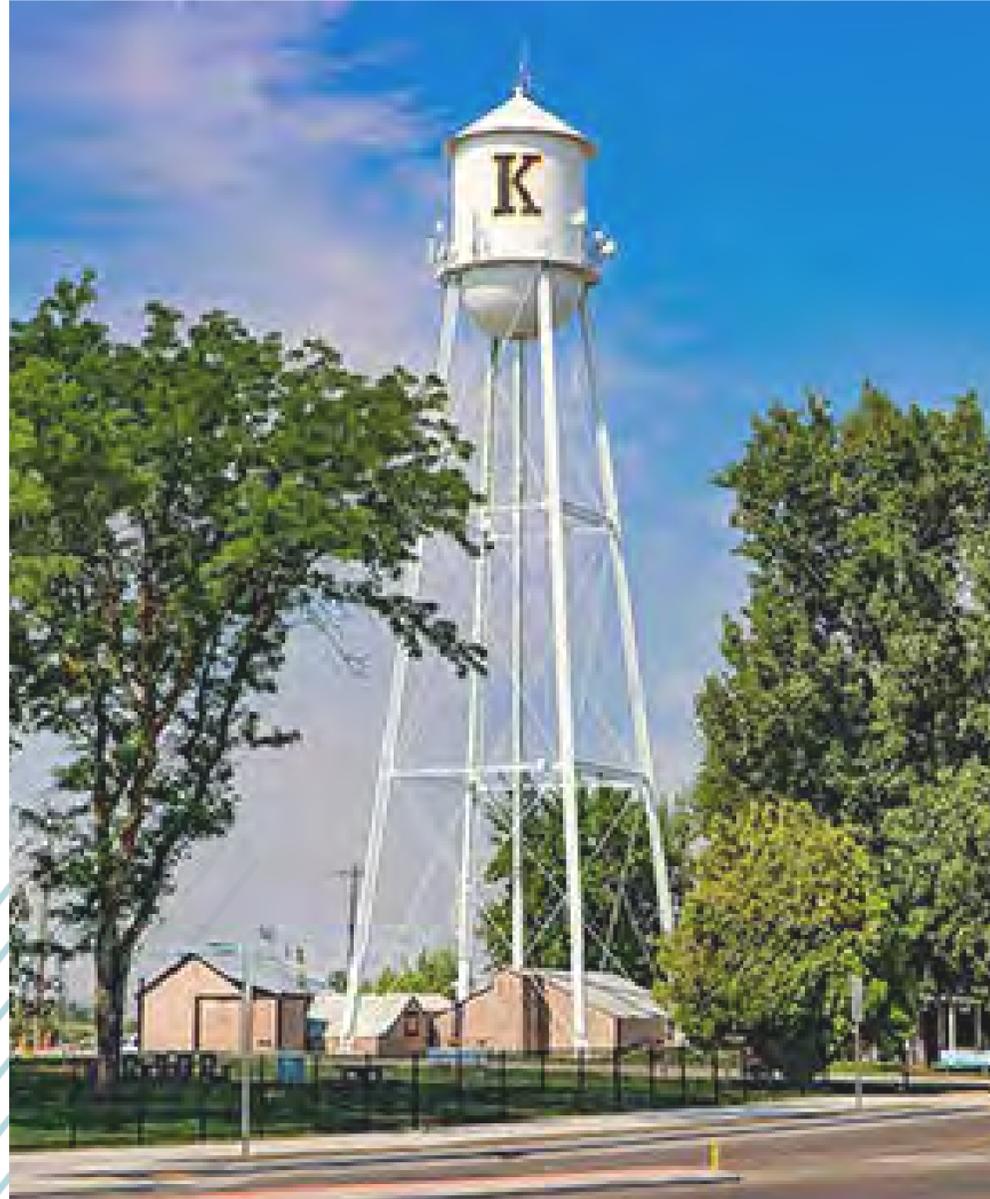
